Analyse video abstracts

With this form you may collect your impressions of existing video abstracts in a structured way. Since video abstracts come in different styles, we recommend to analyse three videos. You are free to choose any video abstract you find openly accessible on the web. Here is one page that might be a good start: https://www.cell.com/video/video-abstracts. (Look also at the guidelines – **but not in the beginning of your research**)

In order to do this properly, you should include the following steps

- 1. Objectives of your short survey
- Answer questions about each video you watch (URL, what you liked and understood, what you liked and understood less, its structure, comparison with written abstract)
- 3. Find your own definition of a video abstract in two sentences
- 4. Summarize your learnings
- 5. Assess, how you achieved your objectives
